### **3Ls**

#### **Monday, March 27 – Students who have 56 or more earned hours by the end of spring 2017**

Beginning at 7:00 am, Monday, March 27, students with 56 or more earned hours by the end of spring 2017 may register for fall classes. Registration for evening classes (6:00pm or later) will be limited to 3L part-time evening students from 7:00 am to 5:00 pm on March 27 but will open to all 3L students at 5:00 pm.

### **2Ls**

#### **Tuesday, March 28 – Students who have 31-55 earned hours by the end of spring 2017**

Beginning at 7:00 am, Tuesday, March 28, students with 31–55 earned hours by the end of spring 2017 may register for fall classes. Registration for evening classes (6:00pm or later) will be limited to 2L part-time evening students from 7:00 am to 5:00 pm on March 28 but will open to all 2L students at 5:00 pm.

### **1Ls**

#### **Wednesday, March 29 – Students who have 23-30 earned hours by the end of spring 2017**

Beginning at 7:00 am, Wednesday, March 29, students with 23–30 earned hours by the end of spring 2017 may register for fall classes. Registration for evening classes (6:00pm or later) will be limited to 1L part-time evening students from 7:00 am to 5:00 pm on March 29 but will open to all 1L students at 5:00 pm.

### **Evening Classes (6:00pm or later)**

Part-time evening students within each class will be given priority to register for evening classes on the first day of that group's registration. As a result:

3L day students may enroll in evening classes beginning at 5:00 pm, Monday, March 27.

2L day students may enroll in evening classes beginning at 5:00 pm, Tuesday, March 28.

1L day students may enroll in evening classes beginning at 5:00 pm, Wednesday, March 29.

*Please note that the registration limitations above apply only for evening classes.*

## REGISTRATION PROCEDURES

There are several ways to register. (We cannot take telephone or faxed registration requests.)

1. [Howdy \(click for link\)](#) Available under the My Records tab. (*This cannot be used for limited enrollment courses or courses requiring professor approval.*) A registration tutorial can also be found there for your convenience.
2. [Electronic Registration Form. \(click for link\)](#) This form should be used primarily for limited enrollment courses. It is available through the law school website Student Services page. If you choose to submit an electronic registration form for non-limited enrollment courses, please be aware that it could take up to 24-48 hours to process these forms.
3. [Paper Registration Form. \(click for PDF\)](#) This form should be used primarily for limited enrollment courses or courses requiring professor approval. It is available through the law school website Student Services page and in the Student Services office. If you choose to submit a hard copy registration form for non-limited enrollment courses, please be aware that it could take up to 24-48 hours to process these forms.

### Other Important Registration Rules

- You must register for limited enrollment courses and courses requiring professor approval either electronically through the law school website Student Services page or by submitting a hard copy to Student Services. Howdy registration is not available.
- Student Services will e-mail your @email.tamu.edu account if your registration request cannot be processed for any reason.

### Adding and Dropping Classes

Students may add classes from March 27–August 25.

The last day to drop a course without a transcript notation is September 6.

The last day to drop a course with a transcript notation is November 6.

### Limited Enrollment Classes & Waitlists

You must submit an Electronic or Paper Course Registration form to Student Services to register for limited enrollment classes (identified as such in the schedule). Student Services will register students for these classes prioritized by each student's earned hours. Students should submit the Course Registration form to Student Services on the day of their priority registration. Waitlisting for these classes will be prioritized by each student's earned hours. Student Services will notify by e-mail all students who have requested registration in these classes to let them know whether they are registered or waitlisted. If you do not see your registration on [Howdy](#), check your law school e-mail or contact Student Services to inquire about your waitlist status.

**Important message about waitlists:** If you are waitlisted for a class, you must submit a course drop form to be removed from that waitlist. If a seat becomes available at any time and you have not submitted a course drop form, you will be registered for that class accordingly. If a seat becomes available and we cannot register you due to a time conflict or overload, and we cannot reach you, we will move to the next person on the waitlist. Please monitor your e-mail frequently if you are on a waitlist.

### Enrollment Limits and Enrollment Certification

Full-time students may take 13 to 16 credit hours. Part-time students may take 8 to 12 credit hours. The Associate Dean for Academic Affairs must approve requests for overloads and underloads. Such requests are granted only under exceptional circumstances. Students must enroll in a minimum of six credits to be eligible for financial aid.

Students who work more than 20 hours a week may take no more than 12 credit hours, including non-classroom courses such as externship, moot court, and law review. Students enrolled in more than 12 credit hours must certify that they are not employed more than 20 hours per week. Full-time students who increase employment hours to more than 20 hours per week during the term must decrease their academic load to part time.

### **Clinic Applications and Registration**

Students can find applications for each clinic on the Registrar's Forms and Applications page. Students who are admitted to the clinic will be enrolled and notified by the Clinical Program Office. Questions about the clinics or the application process can be answered by emailing [experiential@law.tamu.edu](mailto:experiential@law.tamu.edu). Students are encouraged to apply to clinics by April 17<sup>th</sup> at 11:59 p.m. Students who apply by that deadline will be notified of their application status before the end of the semester. Applications received after that time will be reviewed on a rolling basis.

Clinic enrollment requires that students complete or concurrently enroll in Professional Responsibility. Students who have not completed Professional Responsibility and are not registered for the class, will be automatically enrolled by the registrar's office. You may have to drop another course if there is a conflict.

### **Distance Education Learning (online)**

**A student may not earn more than a total of 15 credit hours toward the J.D. degree for approved distance education courses. All distance education courses have a prerequisite of 28 completed credit hours in addition to any other prerequisite.**

**Students are expected to know how to manage computer issues and to have reliable technologies to fulfill course requirements. An up-to-date PC or Mac-based computer with access to high-speed internet is required.**

Courses delivered online may be either synchronous or asynchronous. Synchronous online classes require students and instructors to be online at the same time. Lectures, discussions, chats, etc. occur at a specific time. All students must be online at that specific hour in order to participate.

With asynchronous online courses, lectures, assignments, and other materials are posted online and students may access the material at any time, although the instructor generally sets a definite time period in which students may participate in each online class.

Hybrid courses (also known as blended courses) include both face-to-face classroom meetings and an online component. The online component may be either synchronous or asynchronous.

### **Independent Study**

Independent Study is a one-credit course graded on a pass/fail basis. To receive credit, the student must spend at least 60 hours during the semester in which the student enrolls in Independent Study. Students are responsible for keeping a log of their hours and submitting the log to the supervising faculty member at the end of the semester.

A student may satisfy an independent study by researching and writing a paper of at least 10 pages or reading materials assigned by the sponsoring faculty member. A student may earn no more than two credits through Independent Study.

Students may not enroll in an Independent Study without the consent of a faculty sponsor, who must be a full-time faculty member. The associate Dean for Academic Affairs may approve Independent Study credit with an adjunct faculty member if a full-time faculty member acts as a co-sponsor for the student and reviews the student's work product.



## Changing Division (Day or Evening) or Status (Part-Time or Full Time)

Students who have not completed their lockstep courses may change division or status only under the conditions set out in Academic Standard 11.1. *Students who have completed their lockstep classes may change status or division only with the approval of the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs.*

## Cancellation of Classes

Classes may be cancelled for low enrollment. This decision is made by the Associate Dean of Academic Affairs.

## Pass/Fail Election

You must designate the election of the pass/fail option by submitting an [Electronic](#) or [Paper](#) Pass/Fail Request Form to Student Services no later than Friday, September 1, 2017. You will not be able to elect the pass/fail option when you register online. You must obtain the pass/fail election form from Student Services or the law school web site and submit the completed form to Student Services. To preserve anonymity, students must not communicate a pass/fail election to the professor.

A student may not elect to take a lockstep course, a required course, a course taken to satisfy a rigorous writing requirement, a course taken to satisfy the upper-level oral skills requirement, or a course taken to satisfy the requirements for a certificate program on a Pass/Fail basis, unless the course is offered only on a Pass/Fail basis.

Student Services must first verify your eligibility for pass/fail credit. Please review section 8.5 of the law school's Academic Standards found in the [Student Handbook](#) for rules and limitations on pass/fail credits.

**For students who began law school in or before 2014**, no more than 12 credit hours earned in classes graded on a pass/fail basis may be counted toward the total number of hours required for graduation. Transfer credits are not included in this limit, nor are credits earned for retaking a failed course. Elective classes may comprise not more than 7 credit hours of the maximum 12 credit hours graded as pass/fail. Students may not earn more than 6 pass/fail credit hours in any one activity, such as law review, externship, law clinic, or moot court. Seminars, if taken to satisfy the rigorous writing requirement, may not be taken pass/fail.

**Students who began law school in 2015 or later** may count up to 18 credit hours earned in courses graded on a pass-fail basis towards the total numbers of hours required for graduation and, within those 18 hours, may elect to take up to 3 credit hours of letter-graded courses pass-fail. To receive a P in these elected courses, student will need to receive a C or better. A student who receives below a C will receive the actual grade earned. This does not apply to courses graded only pass/fail.

## Attendance Policy

Students on academic probation or academic warning who exceed 15% of the regularly scheduled class meetings (including make-ups) will be administratively withdrawn and receive no credit for the class. Students not currently on academic warning or academic probation who exceed 25% of the regularly scheduled class meetings (including make-ups) will be administratively withdrawn and receive no credit for the class. Any student withdrawn from a lockstep course will also be withdrawn from law school, pursuant to Academic Standard 5.4. **Attendance requirements in weekend and condensed format classes are explained in the description of the courses.**

### Official days and times for make-ups for cancelled classes:

These are the official make-up times. An absence from a make-up scheduled during the official make-up time IS counted toward the maximum number of allowable absences for the class. An absence from a make-up scheduled at a time other than the official make-up time IS NOT counted.

## **Rigorous Writing Requirement**

Students must satisfy the rigorous writing requirement by completing a law journal comment; or by taking a seminar, completing the required paper, and earning a grade of at least a B- on the paper.

## **The Art of Lawyering**

All 1L students who rank in the bottom one-fourth of their class after their first two semesters in law school are required to complete The Art of Lawyering course in their third (fall) semester. Students required to register for The Art of Lawyering will be contacted and registered by Student Services once spring grades and ranks are posted.

## CONCENTRATIONS

A Concentration is a specialized course of study analogous, in part, to a major in college. Earning a concentration is an official acknowledgment, and a representation to employers, that a student has developed a certain expertise in a particular area of the law.

Certificates of Concentration will be available to students immediately once they have satisfied the requirements for either program. Generally, each concentration requires a particular grade point average in at least 16 hours of related, qualifying courses. In addition, there is a skills requirement, as well as a writing requirement for each of the concentrations. ### **Advanced Topics in Negotiation Seminar (Special Topics)**

**LAW-7900-615** **CRN 32038**

**2 Credits** **Professor: Peter Reilly**

This seminar will explore a series of topics involved in the theories, strategies, and techniques of effective negotiation. Students will submit a research paper that meets the upper-level rigorous writing requirement. In addition to traditional lecture and class discussion, students will engage in simulations and exercises to learn the material. Topics for the research papers may include (but are not limited to): avoiding being exploited, utilizing competitive negotiation moves, increasing collaboration, biases and cognitive illusions, emotions during the negotiation, principles of influence and persuasion, power in negotiation, culture and gender in negotiation, ethical considerations, and critiques of settlement advocacy.

**Prerequisite:** All lockstep courses except Constitutional Law.

It is recommended but not required that students have taken ADR Survey, Negotiation Theory & Practice Practicum, or The Business Negotiator.

### **Communications Law (Special Topics)**

**LAW-7900-602**

**CRN 32033**

**3 Credits**

**Professor: Brian Holland**

This course provides a basic overview of law and policy in the regulation of communications, including broadcasting, cable, wireline and wireless telephony, as well as more advanced areas such as broadband and Internet communications. We will focus on these technological advances to explore the ways in which legal, economic, social, and technological forces shape and are harnessed by legal systems faced with rapid change. The course will draw primarily on leading communications law cases, statutes, and FCC and FTC regulatory actions, focusing on issues such as net neutrality, privacy, free speech and broadcast indecency, competition, and spectrum policy.

**Prerequisite:** One year of law school in the full-time or part-time program.

### **Community Legal Access Clinic (Special Topics)**

**LAW-7900-623**

**CRN 32142**

**2 Credits**

**Professor: Luz Herrera**

This course counts toward the experiential and oral skills requirement.

The Community Legal Access Clinic offers free limited legal assistance to self-represented litigants and offers legal education workshops to community associations in a variety of areas of law, including small claims, landlord tenant, and consumer law. Students will develop workshops and community presentations based on their interests and local legal needs. In addition to learning about self-represented litigants and various legal service delivery methods, students will learn fact-gathering, interviewing, teamwork, and presentation skills.

Since this clinic is designed for students with limited time schedules, the classroom component of the course will meet five times in the fall semester on Saturdays, August 19th, August 26th, September 9th, October 21st, and November 18th, from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. Attendance at all sessions is mandatory. In addition to attending and preparing for classes, students must devote 45 hours of clinic work throughout the semester. Clinic work may be scheduled on weekend and evening periods to accommodate student schedules and community preferences. Students who apply for this clinic will be asked to interview with Dean Herrera before admission to determine availability to complete the hours.

Priority for enrollment will be given to part-time and evening students but all are welcomed to apply.

This course offers an introduction to comparative legal systems. The course will survey the two main legal families; civil and common law. It will also look briefly at mixed legal systems. The second part of the course looks at specific areas of the law from a comparative perspective; namely at comparative judicial politics. The final part of the course looks at recent developments in comparative law and economics; particularly the legal origins literature and the relationship between law and development.

**Prerequisites:** One year of law school in the full-time or part-time program.

## **Comparative Privacy Law (Special Topics)**

**LAW-7900-604**

**CRN 32127**

**1 Credit**

**Professor: Ronald J. Krotoszynski, Jr., John S. Stone Chair, University of Alabama School of Law**

Domestic legal systems vouchsafe and define “privacy,” and its first cousin “dignity,” in different ways that strongly reflect local legal and cultural values. Yet, in an increasingly globalized world, purely local protection of privacy interests may prove insufficient to safeguard effectively fundamental autonomy interests – interests that lie at the core of self-definition, personal autonomy, and freedom. This short course will survey constitutional privacy rights in the United States, Canada, South Africa, the United Kingdom, and in the jurisprudence of the European Court of Human Rights. Consideration of constitutional privacy protections in these jurisdictions will establish important points of transnational agreement about how to define and protect privacy interests; it will also demonstrate that serious disagreements exist about protecting privacy – most notably in resolving the inherent tension between protecting both privacy and the freedom of speech. The course will give sustained attention to the potential benefits and challenges that will confront any serious efforts to harmonize constitutional privacy protections across national borders. A comparative legal analysis of privacy will also illuminate some of the important underlying social and political values that lead the U.S. to fail to protect privacy as reliably or as comprehensively as other liberal democracies. Finally, and no less important in this era of Big Data, drones, and society-wide surveillance programs, the short course will consider carefully the significant interrelationship that exists between privacy and speech in the context of sustaining and facilitating democratic self-government.

**Prerequisite:** One year of law school in the full-time or part-time program.

**Schedule:** This is a condensed “short” fall course that will meet over two weeks during the noon hour.

Class meets from 12:00-1:15pm, September 25-29 and October 2-6.

**Attendance requirements:** This is a condensed course. Students must attend the entire classroom component to earn credit in the course. An absence for any reason will result in administrative withdrawal from the course.

## **Criminal Defense Clinic (Special Topics)**

**LAW-7900-605**      **CRN 32073**

**4 Credits**      **Professor: Amber Baylor**

This course counts toward the oral skills requirement.

In the Criminal Defense Clinic, students learn a model of criminal defense advocacy rooted in a whole-client (holistic) ethos. Students work with clients, client families, community organizations, and experts in various disciplines to defend clients facing misdemeanor charges in Tarrant County Criminal Court. Clinic students will appear in court at pretrial appearances and hearings, potentially representing clients at trial. Students should expect to visit clients incarcerated at the local detention center and to help connect clients to necessary social services.

The Criminal Defense Clinic student teams also work collaboratively on community projects to enhance justice for people interacting with the criminal justice system in Tarrant and surrounding counties. Students in the clinic can expect to:

- Develop client-centered, trauma-sensitive lawyering practices;
- Build trial advocacy skills;
- Critically analyze systemic injustices;
- Recognize issues related to pretrial incarceration;
- Learn to build client narratives and hone negotiation skills;
- Work with interdisciplinary experts; and
- Engage in in-depth fact investigation, including visits to scenes and interviews of witnesses.

### **Family Law & Benefits Clinic (Special Topics)**

The Family Law and Benefits Clinic is both a credit course and a functioning law office, allowing students to practice law while in law school. Students represent indigent clients in court under direct faculty supervision. A classroom component meets twice weekly to study the substantive law, to learn essential practical skills, and to discuss client cases.

Topics include ethics of tax practice; handling of audits; statutes of limitation; assessments of penalties; hearings before the IRS Appeals Office; tax liens; tax collection procedures; and litigation in federal courts.

Have you ever shopped at Walmart or Target and wondered why so many things are made in China. Also, have you ever wondered why the produce at local farmers' markets cost more than the food that is transported from other parts of the world? As you read this, do you know that you are competing with foreign law students who provide legal services to firms in the US?

"Trade" offers the one common thread that can answer the questions above. Indeed, so much of our everyday lives are dictated by matters that revolve around trade laws. The course, titled International Trade Law, proposes to examine the impact of trade on our lives by providing an insight into questions of Trade Policy with specific focus on trade agreements of the World Trade Organization. Thus, the course will cover matters such as tariffs, subsidies and how it affects trade in agriculture, textile, intellectual property issues, services and more. In doing so, this course will critically analyze crucial questions relevant to our times such as globalization, economic development, access to medicine, food security and the role of state in dealing with market forces.

Students will draft a variety of documents throughout the course including a major persuasive motion and response.

**Prerequisites:** One year of law school in the full-time or part-time program, including LARW I and II, and Criminal Procedure.

## **Law & Policy of Clean Energy Innovation (Special Topics)**

What makes it so difficult to move innovative energy technologies out of the lab and into the marketplace? Why is the venture capital model so poorly equipped to finance energy innovation? Is utility regulation a catalyst or roadblock? These are but a few of the questions this class will tackle.

## **Low Income Tax Clinic (Special Topics)**

**4 Credits**

This course counts toward the experiential and oral skills requirement.

The Low Income Tax Clinic is a law office, representing clients before the IRS and the U.S. Tax Court, for which you will receive course credit and a grade. The course is offered for four hours credit in the fall and spring and three hours credit in the summer. The course includes a classroom component, held twice a week. Students should expect to devote fourteen (14) to sixteen (16) hours per week during the main semesters and seventeen (17) to twenty-one (21) hours per week during the summer.

You will work directly with clients and have primary responsibility for your assigned cases, under a special appearance authorization by the IRS and with supervision by the clinic director. If the case goes to trial at the Tax Court, you will be able to participate in the trial with permission by the judge. This will be great real world experience for you, and help develop skills you'll use even if you don't practice tax law, while also providing an important service to taxpayers.

Participation in the clinic requires approval by the clinic director, based on an application. Students who have completed one year of law school and are in good standing with no Honor Code violations are eligible. No Howdy registration.

**Prerequisites:** Federal Income Tax and Federal Tax Practice & Procedure; the latter may be taken concurrently. No other tax courses or experience are required to be selected. A maximum of 8 students per semester will be enrolled.

The course explores the problems and benefits of legalization; examines various approaches to regulation and taxation of these businesses; and the practical problems involved in an industry that is still illegal at the federal level.

### **Mediation Certification Workshop (Special Topics)**

To achieve this objective, we will first focus on the principles, concepts, and rules of trial advocacy and evidence. This will be facilitated by experienced litigators who will offer their insight into the realities of trial work. The students will then apply what they have learned by practicing the skill, reflecting on what was taught, improving, and repeating.

## **Comparative Privacy Law (Special Topics)**

**LAW-7900-604**

**CRN 32127**

**1 Credit**

**Professor: Ronald J. Krotoszynski, Jr.,** John S. Stone Chair, University of Alabama School of Law

Domestic legal systems vouchsafe and define “privacy,” and its first cousin “dignity,” in different ways that strongly reflect local legal and cultural values. Yet, in an increasingly globalized world, purely local protection of privacy interests may prove insufficient to safeguard effectively fundamental autonomy interests – interests that lie at the core of self-definition, personal autonomy, and freedom. This short course will survey constitutional privacy rights in the United States, Canada, South Africa, the United Kingdom, and in the jurisprudence of the European Court of Human Rights. Consideration of constitutional privacy protections in these jurisdictions will establish important points of transnational agreement about how to define and protect privacy interests; it will also demonstrate that serious disagreements exist about protecting privacy – most notably in resolving the inherent tension between protecting both privacy and the freedom of speech. The course will give sustained attention to the potential benefits and challenges that will confront any serious efforts to harmonize constitutional privacy protections across national borders. A comparative legal analysis of privacy will also illuminate some of the important underlying social and political values that lead the U.S. to fail to protect privacy as reliably or as comprehensively as other liberal democracies. Finally, and no less important in this era of Big Data, drones, and society-wide surveillance programs, the short course will consider carefully the significant interrelationship that exists between privacy and speech in the context of sustaining and facilitating democratic self-government.

**Schedule: This is a condensed “short” fall course that will meet over two weeks during the noon hour.**

Class meets from 12:00-1:15pm, September 25-29 and October 2-6.

**Prerequisite:** One year of law school in the full-time or part-time program.

**Attendance requirements:** This is a condensed course. Students must attend the entire classroom component to earn credit in the course. An absence for any reason will result in administrative withdrawal from the course.

## **International Taxation (Special Topics)**

**LAW-7900-608**

**CRN 32133**

**2 Credits**

**Professor: William Byrnes**

In six Saturday sessions, the core concepts of the U.S. taxation of individuals and corporations ‘inbound’ and ‘outbound’ activities will be surveyed. Moreover, the course will compare U.S. tax practice with its trading partners as well as examine key tax policy drivers of international organizations.

**Prerequisite:** Federal Income Tax and pre-course reading.

## **International Trade Law**

**LAW-7222-601**

**CRN 32116**

**2 Credits**

**Professor: Srividhya Ragavan**

Have you ever shopped at Walmart or Target and wondered why so many things are made in China. Also, have you ever wondered why the produce at local farmers' markets cost more than the food that is transported from other parts of the world? As you read this, do you know that you are competing with foreign law students who provide legal services to firms in the US?

"Trade" offers the one common thread that can answer the questions above. Indeed, so much of our everyday lives are dictated by matters that revolve around trade laws. The course, titled International Trade Law, proposes to examine the impact of trade on our lives by providing an insight into questions of Trade Policy with specific focus on trade agreements of the World Trade Organization. Thus, the course will cover matters such as tariffs, subsidies and how it affects trade in agriculture, textile, intellectual property issues, services and more. In doing so, this course will critically analyze crucial questions relevant to our times such as globalization, economic development, access to medicine, food security and the role of state in dealing with market forces.

The course will cover institutional and constitutional arrangements as well as the recent political developments. This course will also discuss the role of European Union Law within international and national law and make direct comparisons to US federal and state law.

The course will introduce students to the basics of international and comparative law, cross cultural communication, and being a global professional. This course will introduce students to the challenges of developing rule of law in a post-conflict environment. Students will study how the history of conflicts and genocide impact the Cambodian legal system.

This course includes a field trip to Cambodia. All short study field courses will be in three segments for a total of 2 credits graded. Students will complete the Field Study Preparation for 0.5 credits as a Spring 2017 course with the Field Study Trip Completed in May and the Field Study Debrief and Reflection Exercises completed during the Fall semester 2017 for an additional 1.5 credits.

**Prerequisite:** Successful completion of first semester of law school by Fall 2016. Students must have registered for the Spring 2017 course to qualify. **May 2017 anticipated graduates may not register for this course.**

**Schedule:** The course will include both U.S. and Cambodia class sessions.

The law school class sessions will meet on Fridays, September 1, September 29 and October 6 from 12:00 to 2:15 p.m.

The Cambodia sessions are May 14-29, subject to change.

**Attendance requirements:** Students must attend the entire classroom component to earn credit in the course. **An absence for any reason will result in administrative withdrawal from the course.**

## **Introduction to Ghana: Land Use Conflicts (Special Topics)**

**CRN 32386**

**1.5 Credits**

**Professor: Vice Dean Aric Short and Thomas Mitchell**

Students in this course learn the basics of international and comparative law, cross-cultural communication, and being a global professional. This course will also address the history, culture, and legal issues that provide context for the students' study of land use conflicts in Ghana in May of 2017.

This course includes a field trip to Ghana. All short study field courses will be in three segments for a total of 2 credits graded. Students will complete the Field Study Preparation for 0.5 credits as a Spring 2017 course with the Field Study Trip Completed in May and the Field Study Debrief and Reflection Exercises completed during the Fall semester 2017 for an additional 1.5 credits.

**Prerequisite:** Successful completion of first semester of law school by Fall 2016. Students must have registered for the Spring 2017 course to qualify. **May 2017 anticipated graduates may not register for this course.**

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The law school class sessions will meet on Fridays, September 1, September 29 and October 6 from 12:00 to 2:15 p.m.

## **Introduction to Jersey: Facilitating Trade (Special Topics)**

**CRN 32387**

**1.5 Credits**

**Professor: Dean Andrew Morriss and William Magnuson**

The course will introduce students to the basics of international and comparative law, cross cultural communication, and being a global professional. Jersey is a major international financial center and the course will introduce students to how businesses and investors make use of Jersey structures to invest in Great Britain, the EU, and the world. This course will introduce students to the British Constitution, European Union financial regulation and the legal issues involved in wealth management.

This course includes a field trip to Jersey. All short study field courses will be in three segments for a total of 2 credits graded. Students will complete the Field Study Preparation for 0.5 credits as a Spring 2017 course with the Field Study Trip Completed in May and the Field Study Debrief and Reflection Exercises completed during the Fall semester 2017 for an additional 1.5 credits.

**Prerequisite:** Successful completion of first semester of law school by Fall 2016. Students must have registered for the Spring 2017 course to qualify. **May 2017 anticipated graduates may not register for this course.**

**Schedule:** The course will include both U.S. and Jersey class sessions.

## **Mediation Certification Workshop (Special Topics)**

**1 Credit**

**Professor: Kimberlee Kovach**

This course counts toward the experiential and oral skills requirement.

This course provides the opportunity to develop mediation skills, and an introduction to mediation law and policy. Through discussions, exercises and simulations, students examine the mediation process and techniques used to assist participants in reaching mutually agreeable resolutions. In doing so, students also learn underlying negotiation orientations and strategies.

**Prerequisite:** One year of law school in the full-time or part-time program.

Registration priority will go to students who have not previously taken the Family Mediation Clinic or Mediation Clinic.

## **Moot Court Appellate Advocacy (Special Topics)**

**LAW-7900-629**

**CRN 33262**

**1 Credit**

**Professor: Joseph Spence**

This course counts toward the experiential requirement.

This is a simulation course that offers students a substantial experience of engaging in tasks that that will help the students develop skills that, as attorneys, they will utilize as advisors and advocates in litigation and appellate matters. More specifically, this course is designed to provide students with basic oral and writing skills required to effectively participate in a moot court competition.

This course will:

- Provide students with skills training in brief writing and oral advocacy;
- Improve the performance of our students in external moot court competitions;
- Help students self-assess areas of strengths and weaknesses; and
- Foster greater collaboration among members of the Moot Court Team.

**Prerequisite:** One year of law school in the full-time or part-time program.

## **Post-Conviction Actual Innocence Claims**

**LAW-7217-601**

**CRN 32129**

**2 Credits**

**Professor: Michael Ware**

This course counts toward the experiential requirement.

This course will teach the law and the practical applications of the law in petitioning the judiciary for relief, based on facts garnered through an initial post-conviction investigation. Students will learn what a post-conviction claim of actual innocence is and how the United States Supreme Court and the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals have analyzed and dealt with such claims in both death penalty and non-death cases. Students will study actual cases relevant to the subject.

Students will be expected to effectively apply the Texas post-conviction DNA testing statute to hypothetical scenarios. In addition, students will be expected to effectively draft T.C.C.P. art. 11.07 and T.C.C.P. art. 11.071 writs based on hypothetical cases. Students will also be expected to understand and effectively deal with potential procedural bars to their actual innocence claims.

**Prerequisite:** One year of law school in the full-time or part-time program; including Criminal Law.

**Schedule:** Class meets from 10:00am-3:00pm on Saturdays, September 2, September 16, September 30, October 7, October 28, and November 11.

**Attendance requirements:** A student cannot miss more than 1 class without being administratively withdrawn.

## **Special Skills and Approaches in Mediation (Special Topics)**

**CRN 32134**

**1 Credit**

**Professor: Kovach**

This course builds on basic mediation, with focus on prominent process approaches. It provides in-depth examinations of important issues in mediation practice such as information processing, barriers to settlement, and decision making. Skill enhancement includes techniques used at various stages to assist moving parties beyond impasse in difficult cases.

**Prerequisite:** (1) One year of law school in the full-time or part-time program; (2) Mediation Certification Workshop (may be taken concurrently).

## **Trial Advocacy for Mock Trial Students (Special Topics)**

**1 Credit**

This concentrated course is designed to teach students effective trial advocacy skills necessary to persuasively present a case to a decision maker. While the competition environment of mock trial presents its own distinct challenges, the analysis, preparation, and presentation skills necessary for success are parallel or comparable to those required in a real-life courtroom situation. To achieve this objective, we will first focus on the principles, concepts, and rules of trial advocacy and evidence. This will be facilitated by experienced litigators who will offer their insight into the realities of trial work. The students will then apply what they have learned by practicing the skill, reflecting on what was taught, improving, and repeating.
