Tuesday, April 7 – Students who have 56 or more earned hours by the end of spring 2015

Beginning at 7:00 am, Tuesday, April 7, students with 56 or more earned hours by the end of spring 2015 may register for fall classes. Registration for evening classes (6:00pm or later) will be limited to 3L part-time evening students from 7:00 am to 5:00 pm on April 7 but will open to all 3L students at 5:00 pm.

2Ls

Wednesday, April 8 – Students who have 30-55 earned hours by the end of spring 2015

Beginning at 7:00 am, Wednesday, April 8, students with 30–55 earned hours by the end of spring 2015 may register for fall classes. Registration for evening classes (6:00pm or later) will be limited to 2L part-time evening students from 7:00 am to 5:00 pm on April 8 but will open to all 2L students at 5:00 pm.

1Ls

Thursday, April 9 – Students who have 22-29 earned hours by the end of spring 2015

Beginning at 7:00 am, Thursday, April 9, students with 22–29 earned hours by the end of spring 2015 may register for fall classes. Registration for evening classes (6:00pm or later) will be limited to 1L part-time evening students from 7:00 am to 5:00 pm on April 9 but will open to all 1L students at 5:00 pm.

Evening Classes (6:00pm or later)

Part-time evening students within each class will be given priority to register for evening classes on the first day of that group's registration. As a result:

3L day students may enroll in evening classes beginning at 5:00 pm, Tuesday, April 7.

2L day students may enroll in evening classes beginning at 5:00 pm, Wednesday, April 8.

1L day students may enroll in evening classes beginning at 5:00 pm, Thursday, April 9.

Please note that the registration limitations above apply only for evening classes.

REGISTRATION PROCEDURES

There are several ways to register. (We cannot take telephone, e-mail, or faxed registration requests.)

1. **Howdy** ([click for link](#)) Available under the My Records tab. (*This cannot be used for limited enrollment courses or courses requiring professor approval.*) Registration Tutorials can be found there for your convenience.
2. **Electronic Registration Form.** ([click for link](#)) This form should be used primarily for limited enrollment courses or courses requiring professor approval. It is available through the law school website Student Services page. If you choose to submit an electronic registration form for non-limited enrollment courses, please be aware that it could take up to 24-hours to process these forms.
3. **Paper Registration Form.** ([click for link](#)) This form should be used primarily for limited enrollment courses or courses requiring professor approval. It is available through the law school website Student Services page and in the Student Services office. If you choose to submit a hard copy registration form for non-limited enrollment courses, please be aware that it could take up to 24-hours to process these forms.

Other Important Registration Rules

- Do not submit registration forms before your assigned days. Student Services will not accept early requests and will not be responsible for forms submitted early.
- You must register for limited enrollment courses and courses requiring professor approval either electronically through the law school website Student Services page or by submitting a hard copy to Student Services.
- Student Services will e-mail your @email.tamu.edu account if your registration request cannot be processed for any reason.

Adding and Dropping Classes

Students may add classes from April 7–August 28. After August 28, students may add classes only with the permission of the professor and the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs.

The last day to drop a course without a transcript notation is September 9.

The last day to drop a course with a transcript notation is November 2.

Limited Enrollment Classes & Waitlists

You must submit an Electronic or Paper Course Registration form to Student Services to register for limited enrollment classes (identified as such in the schedule). Student Services will register students for these classes prioritized by each student's earned hours. Students should submit the Course Registration form to Student Services on the day of their

priority registration. Waitlisting for these classes will be prioritized by each student's earned credits. Student Services will notify by e-mail all students who have requested registration in these classes to let them know whether they are registered or waitlisted. If you do not see your registration on [Howdy](#), check your law school e-mail (@email.tamu.edu) or contact Student Services to inquire about your waitlist status.

Important message about waitlists: If you are waitlisted for a class, you must submit a course drop form to be removed from that waitlist. If a seat becomes available at any time and you have not submitted a course drop form, you will be registered for that class accordingly. If a seat becomes available and we cannot register you due to a time conflict or overload, and we cannot reach you, we will move to the next person on the waitlist. Please monitor your e-mail frequently if you are on a waitlist.

Enrollment Limits and Enrollment Certification

Full-time students may take 13 to 16 credit hours. A full-time student must take a majority of classes during the day. Part-time students may take 8 to 12 credit hours. The Associate Dean for Academic Affairs must approve requests for overloads and underloads. Such requests are granted only under exceptional circumstances. Students must enroll in a minimum of six credits to be eligible for financial aid.

Students who work more than 20 hours a week may take no more than 12 credit hours, including non-classroom courses such as externship, moot court, and law review. Students enrolled in more than 12 credit hours must certify that they are not employed more than 20 hours per week. Full-time students who increase employment hours to more than 20 hours per week during the term must decrease their academic load to part time.

Distance Education Learning (online)

A student may not earn more than a total of 15 credit hours toward the J.D. degree for approved distance education courses. All distance education courses have a prerequisite of 28 completed credit hours in addition to any other prerequisite.

Changing Division (Day or Evening) or Status (Part-Time or Full Time)

Students who have not completed their lockstep courses may change division or status only under the conditions set out in Academic Standard 11.1. *Students who have completed their lockstep classes may change status or division only with the approval of the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs.*

Cancellation of Classes

Classes may be cancelled for low enrollment. This decision is made by the Associate Dean of Academic Affairs.

Pass/Fail Election

You must designate the election of the pass/fail option by submitting an [Electronic](#) or [Paper](#) Pass/Fail Request Form to Student Services no later than Friday, September 4, 2015. You will not be able to elect the pass/fail option when you register online. You must obtain the pass/fail election form from Student Services or the law school web site and submit the completed form to Student Services. To preserve anonymity, students must not communicate a pass/fail election to the professor.

Student Services must first verify your eligibility for pass/fail credit. Please review section 8.5 of the law school's Academic Standards found in the [Student Handbook](#) for rules and limitations on pass/fail credits. No more than 12 credit hours earned in classes graded on a pass/fail basis may be counted toward the total number of hours required for graduation.

Transfer credits are not included in this limit, nor are credits earned for retaking a failed course. **Required courses are not eligible to be taken as pass/fail. Letter-graded elective classes that are taken pass/fail may comprise not more than 7 credit hours of the maximum 12 credit hours graded as pass/fail.** Students may not earn more than 6 pass/fail credit hours in any one activity, such as law review, externship, law clinic, or moot court. Seminars, if taken to satisfy the rigorous writing requirement, may not be taken pass/fail.

Attendance Policy

Students on academic probation or academic warning who exceed 15% of the regularly scheduled class meetings (including make-ups) will be administratively withdrawn and receive no credit for the class. Students not currently on academic warning or academic probation who exceed 25% of the regularly scheduled class meetings (including make-ups) will be administratively withdrawn and receive no credit for the class. Any student withdrawn from a lockstep course will also be withdrawn from law school, pursuant to Academic Standard 5.3. Attendance requirements in weekend and condensed format classes are explained in the description of the courses.

Official days and times for make-ups for cancelled classes:

These are the official make-up times. An absence from a make-up scheduled during the official make-up time IS counted toward the maximum number of allowable absences for the class. An absence from a make-up scheduled at a time other than the official make-up time IS NOT counted.

CONCENTRATIONS

A Concentration is a specialized course of study analogous, in part, to a major in college. Earning a concentration is an official acknowledgment, and a representation to employers, that a student has developed a certain expertise in a particular area of the law.

Certificates of Concentration will be available to students immediately once they have satisfied the requirements for either program. Generally, each concentration requires a particular grade point average in at least 16 hours of related, qualifying courses. In addition, there is a skills requirement, as well as a writing requirement for each of the concentrations. NEW FACULTY

Susan Saab Fortney will teach Professional Responsibility.

Professor Fortney comes to A&M from Hofstra University in New York, where she was the Howard Lichtenstein Distinguished Professor of Legal Ethics and Director of the Institute for the Study of Legal Ethics. Before joining Hofstra, Professor Fortney taught and served as the Interim Dean at Texas Tech University School of Law. *Texas Lawyer* selected her as one of the 30 Extraordinary Women in Texas Law. She also is one of the seven members of the National Conference of Bar Examiners Committee that drafts the Multi-state Professional Responsibility Examination.

William Henning will teach Sales & Leases.

Professor Henning is a preeminent scholar in commercial law and has received multiple awards for teaching excellence. He is the former Executive Director of the Uniform Law Commission, a delegate for the U.S. Department of State on several international commercial law development projects, and a member of the Permanent Editorial Board of the Uniform Commercial Code. Professor Henning comes to us from the University of Alabama School of Law; he previously taught at the University of Missouri-Columbia.

Glynn S. Lunney, Jr. will teach Trademarks and Unfair Competition Law.

Professor Lunney is prolific scholar and author of *CASES AND MATERIALS ON TRADEMARK LAW*. He is coming to A&M from Tulane University School of Law, where serves as the Joseph Merrick Jones Chair and McGlinchey Stafford Professor of Law. He has had a distinguished career that includes expertise in patent, copyright and trademark law, unfair competition, and contracts. Professor Lunney received his petroleum engineering degree from Texas A&M, is a registered patent attorney, and has a Ph.D. in economics.

Angela Morrison will teach LARW I.

Professor Morrison has been teaching at the University of Nevada – Las Vegas William S. Boyd School of Law since 2011. She has written multiple articles, essays, and practice guides in employment discrimination law and human trafficking.

Saurabh Vishnubhakat will teach Patent Law.

Professor Vishnubhakat is completing a postdoctoral fellowship at Duke University School of Law where he is researching and writing in the area of patent law. Since 2011, he has been Advisor to the United States Patent and Trademark Office (USPTO), where he counsels the Chief Economist and agency leadership on legal and economic implications of U.S. patent policy.

Peter K. Yu will teach Copyrights.

Professor Yu is a leading expert in intellectual property and communications law. He is coming from Drake University Law School, where he holds the Kern Family Chair in Intellectual Property Law and was the founding director of the Intellectual Property Law Center. He is a prolific scholar and an award-winning teacher. He serves as the general editor of *The WIPO Journal* published by the World Intellectual Property Organization (WIPO) and chairs the Committee on International Intellectual Property of the American Branch of the International Law Association.

We also will have new adjunct faculty:

Brandon Barnett will teach Military Justice.

Major Burnett is a Reserve Marine Corps Judge Advocate, and practices military defense and state criminal defense. As a Marine judge advocate, Mr. Barnett served as a criminal trial lawyer in courts-martial and administrative hearings, handling a wide range of cases involving high-level violations of the Uniform Code of Military Justice. He was a contributor to *MODERN MILITARY JUSTICE* and received his LL.M from George Washington University School of Law.

James Bradbury will teach Agricultural Law.

Mr. Bradbury advises clients in the areas of agricultural law and policy, environmental issues, water law and policy, business law, regulatory and legislative matters. Mr. Bradbury serves as a technical advisor to the U.S. Department of State on regulatory and environmental issues in unconventional resources production and regularly speaks on environmental issues as they affect public policy.

Zach Burt will teach LARW III: Real Estate Drafting.

As Vice President for Mineral Management at Bank of America, Mr. Burt manages mineral rights for large institutional clients. Prior to joining Bank of America, Mr. Burt was Manager of Mineral and Water Rights for Union Pacific Railroad and an associate with Harris, Finley and Bogle where he practiced transactional law and worked with clients on land acquisition and divestiture projects.

Tara Kepler will teach Health Care Technology & the Law.

Ms. Kepler taught this course for the first time last fall. We are pleased to offer it this fall to evening students. Ms. Kepler began her health law practice with Haynes and Boone in Dallas and has practiced health law in both large and small firms in California and Texas. She is the co-author of *TELEMEDICINE: SURVEY & ANALYSIS OF STATE & FEDERAL LAWS*.

NEW COURSES

Agricultural Law (Special Topics)

LAW-7900-607 CRN 27239

2 Credits

Professor: James Bradbury

This survey course is designed to touch upon some of the major areas of agricultural law. Specifically, the course will take a practical approach, including discussions and hands-on assignments to prepare students for practicing in the area of agricultural law including drafting leases, preparing client letters, developing checklists for use in practice, and drafting a brief summary of an agricultural law issue of the students' choosing. Legal issues relating to animal agriculture, food safety, landowner rights, the interaction between agriculture and energy production, agricultural leases, agricultural policy, and estate and succession planning for farm families will be discussed.

Prerequisite: One year of law school in the full-time or part-time program.

Special Topics: Anti-Terrorism and Criminal Enforcement

LAW-7900-611 CRN 27274

2 Credits

Professor: Sahar Aziz

This federal criminal law course focuses on the investigation and prosecution of anti-terrorism crimes. To that end, students will learn criminal law-related legislation dealing with terrorism, detention and adjudication-related issues, and techniques of investigation and information-gathering methods used in anti-terrorism criminal enforcement, as well as the civil liberties implications.

Prerequisite: One year in law school in the full-time or part-time program, including Criminal Law.

Special Topics: Contemporary Issues in Water Resources: U.S. Mexico Water, Food, Energy Nexus, Guanajuato, Mexico

LAW-7900-612 CRN 27308

2 Credits

Professor: Gabriel Eckstein & Gina Warren

This 2-credit fieldtrip course is a combined classroom and field experience in Guanajuato, Mexico, designed to provide an interdisciplinary perspective into and knowledge of the water, food, and energy nexus in the U.S. and Mexico. Utilizing law, policy, science, economics, and social considerations, students enrolled in this course will gain valuable insight into these interrelated and interdependent fields and learn how to serve a variety of clients, such as agriculture interests, manufacturers, energy developers and producers, environmental organizations, municipalities, and governmental agencies. Students from other Texas A&M University graduate disciplines will also participate in this program, and classes will be taught by American and Mexican faculty and specialists from diverse backgrounds and professions. Relevant field trips to ejidos (registered communal agricultural lands), water reservoirs, water treatment facilities, mines, and food production operations, as well as various cultural visits, will enrich the academic components of the program and provide students with technical, practical, cultural, and other unique experiences.

Prerequisite: (1) One year in law school in the full-time or part-time program; (2) Energy Law; and (3) Water Law

Class Sessions: The course will include both U.S. and Mexico class sessions. The Mexico sessions will meet during August 17-28. The class sessions at the law school will meet on August 14 (time TBA) and in September (date and time TBA).

Enrollment is limited to three law students. [Application required.](#)

Special Topics: Fatherhood & the Law Seminar

LAW-7900-603 CRN 27174

2 Credits

Professor: Malinda Seymore

The meaning of fatherhood and the rights and responsibilities of fathers has changed over the centuries, from the age when fathers possessed their marital children as chattels to a time when maternal preferences in child custody legally dispossessed most fathers of their children. Today, despite the death of the maternal preference, much of law presupposes that fathers – and in particular nonmarital fathers – are generally disinterested in being parents. These attitudes affect laws concerning abortion, adoption, child custody, child support, absent fathers, presumptions of paternity, paternity fraud, paternity leave, and a host of other issues affecting fathers. This seminar will examine these issues.

Prerequisite: All lockstep courses except Constitutional Law.

Special Topics: Information Privacy Law

LAW-7900-604

CRN 27195

3 Credits

Professor: Brian Holland

This course explores multiple issues related to the concept of information privacy. It examines the collection, use, protection and disclosure of personal and other information both by government entities and private sector actors, both domestically and as regards cross-jurisdictional data flow. The course considers multiple regulatory schemes, including constitutional, tort, contract, property, statutory, administrative and international rules.

Prerequisite: One year in law school in the full-time or part-time program.

Special Topics: International Petroleum Transactions

LAW-7900-605

CRN 27230

3 Credits

Professor: Harry Sullivan

This course examines the laws, legal issues and principal contracts utilized in the international oil and gas industry in respect of the exploration for, production and marketing of oil and gas. The class will survey: ownership of mineral rights internationally; the role of the National Oil Company and Government regulators; international legal due diligence; political and other risks associated with international investments; the forms and structure of host government agreements granting the right to explore and exploit oil and gas; the forms and structure of the principal contracts used in the international oil and gas industry, including Confidentiality Agreements, Study and Bid Agreements, Drilling Contracts, Services Agreements, Farmout Agreements, Joint Operating Agreements, Unitization Agreements and oil and gas marketing agreements; an examination of available industry model contract forms; sustainable development in oil and gas exploitation; environmental protection in international oil and gas exploration and exploitation; and extraterritorial reach of certain U.S. laws applicable to the international oil and gas industry, including anti-corruption laws, trade sanctions and export restrictions. The focus of the course is to provide practical knowledge of international oil and gas legal issues and contracts by working with actual international oil and gas contract.

Prerequisite: One year in law school in the full-time or part-time program.

Special Topics: International Water Law Seminar

LAW-7900-606

CRN 27237

2 Credits

Professor: Gabriel Eckstein

This two-credit seminar will consider the basic concepts of international law and policy relating to the uses of and rights to freshwater resources (both surface and ground water). Discussion topics will include: availability, distribution, and scarcity of global freshwater; rights to and sovereignty over natural resources; conflict, conflict resolution, and dispute prevention; the ethics of and human right to water; water and the environment; and international law regarding the development, exploitation, and conservation of transboundary freshwater resources.

Prerequisite: All lockstep courses except Constitutional Law.

Special Topics: LARW III: Public Policy Drafting

LAW-7900-609

CRN 27258

2 Credits

Professor: Lisa Rich

This course introduces students to the various forms of written (and oral) communication encountered in the public policymaking process, particularly in regulated industries. In addition to gaining an overview of “public policy,” students will learn about the various communication strategies and skills necessary to participate in the policymaking process. Students will reveal the skills learned through a series of exercises culminating in a “briefing binder” containing examples of the various skills they have learned throughout the course.

This course is a required prerequisite for participation in either the Semester in D.C. or Semester in Austin programs that we anticipate offering in spring 2016.

Prerequisite: One year in law school in the full-time or part-time program, including LARW I and II.

Special Topics: Marijuana Law, Policy, and Business Seminar

LAW-7900-610

CRN 27261

2 Credits

Professor: Frank Snyder

This seminar explores the legal, public policy, and business issues that are raised by the growth of medical and recreational marijuana businesses in many U.S. states. The course explores the problems and benefits of legalization, examines various approaches to regulation and taxation of these businesses, and the practical problems involved in an industry that is still illegal at the federal level.

Prerequisite: All lockstep courses except Constitutional Law.

Special Topics: Military Justice

LAW-7900-601

CRN 27140

2 Credits

Professor: Brandon W. Barnett, Major USMCR

This course examines the military justice system. Students will learn about the statutes, policies, and rules governing the military justice process and jurisdiction from investigation through trial and the appellate process. The course begins with an overview of the military justice system, emphasizing the role of commanders and military attorneys and alternatives to trial by court-martial. The course will also cover military criminal procedure governing all phases of a court-martial proceeding and substantive law criminal law, focusing on crimes and defenses specific to the military. The relationship of military courts to civilian courts and the use of military commissions for trying enemy combatants for war crimes and other offense will also be discussed.

Prerequisite: One year in law school in the full-time or part-time program, including Criminal Law.

Special Topics: State and Local Trade Barriers

LAW-7900-613

CRN 27380

2 Credits

Professors: Dean Andrew P. Morris and William Henning

Law students will collaborate with students from the Bush School of Policy and Government Service on a project for the North American Strategy for Competitiveness (NASCO), a nonprofit voluntary coalition of North American governments, businesses and educational institutions. One of NASCO's core missions is improving the competitiveness of the North American supply chain. NASCO is concerned that regulatory efforts at the state and local level are creating barriers to trade along the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) corridor. Students in this course will analyze trade patterns and data and provide NASCO with a report describing any trade frictions they uncover as products move across national and state boundaries, and develop a framework for dealing with regulations that impose undue burdens on the free flow of goods and services in North America. At the end of the course they will present their findings to NASCO.

Prerequisites: One year in law school in the full-time or part-time program. Administrative Law or International Business Transactions is preferred, but not required.

Students are required to enroll in both the fall 2015 and spring 2016 semesters. Two credits will be awarded each semester. Collaboration with students from the Bush School will require law students to sometimes attend joint sessions in College Station. There may also be course related travel to border crossings and other locations to investigate problems. Some funding to subsidize travel will be available.

Advanced Topics in Intellectual Property Seminar (*Distance Education Course*)

LAW-7628-601

CRN 27257

2 Credits

Professor: Megan Carpenter

This course provides an in-depth exploration and analysis of various issues in intellectual property law through an analysis of some of the seminal cases in IP jurisprudence. In contrast to many law school courses, which enable the study of law through excerpted portions of cases on particular topics, this course will dig beneath the surface and explore the depths of intellectual property theory and policy as they manifest in individual cases throughout history. We will not seek to canvass the area of IP, but rather explore foundational aspects of intellectual property through individual case stories, other primary and secondary resource material, and seminal law review articles.

Class Sessions: This course will have in-class meetings from 6:00-7:50 p.m. on August 24, 31, September 14, 28, October 12, 26, and November 9, 23. The other credit hours will be delivered through online classes each week. Attendance will be taken for each in-class and online meeting and the course will be considered as a class that meets once a week for attendance standards.

Prerequisite: 28 completed credit hours; two Intellectual Property courses.

Mediation Clinic

LAW-7881S-601

CRN 27253

3 Credits

Professor: Kay Elliott

This course counts toward the oral skills requirement.

The Mediation Clinic is a graded course with a mid-term exam and a final exam, which is given during the regular exam period. The course is designed to enhance a law student's problem-solving and advocacy skills. Since 95% of all cases settle before trial, most lawyers will be involved in mediation. This course follows the standards for mediation training promulgated by the Texas Mediation Trainers Roundtable. To pass the course and receive credit, the student must attend the entire 40 hours of classroom training and participate in the role plays, performing as a mediator and as a disputant. The student must also satisfactorily complete the clinic portion of the training, which consists of mediations or observations at Dispute Resolution Centers and other locations. In addition, students must submit a journal for each case mediated or observed and must receive a passing grade on the mid-term and the final exam. The final exam will consist of both a multiple-choice test and a videotaped mock mediation.

Students who satisfactorily complete the course receive a mediation certificate, which is the required qualification for mediating court-annexed cases under Texas law. Those who receive the mediation certificate will be eligible to apply to be a credentialed mediator.

Prerequisite: One year of law school in the full-time or part-time program.

Registration:

Students must submit a separate [Mediation Clinic application](#), which is available at Student Services. Note that if, during the semester you intend to take Mediation Clinic, you are: graduating, working full-time, taking the bar exam, studying for the bar exam, or commuting a long distance, you may not have the flexibility in your schedule to complete the required mediations. If Professor Elliott determines that you will be unable to complete the required mediations in a timely manner, you will be ineligible to enroll. Enrollment limited to 18 students.

You must obtain the written materials required for the course, read the assignments before the first weekend's class, and bring the required materials to class.

Post-Conviction Actual Innocence Claims

LAW-7217-601 CRN 27255

2 Credits

Professor: Michael Ware

This course will teach the law and the practical applications of the law in petitioning the judiciary for relief, based on facts garnered through an initial post-conviction investigation. Students will learn what a post-conviction claim of actual innocence is and how the United States Supreme Court and the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals have analyzed and dealt with such claims in both death penalty and non-death cases. Students will study actual cases relevant to the subject.

Students will be expected to effectively apply the Texas post-conviction DNA testing statute to hypothetical scenarios. In addition, students will be expected to effectively draft T.C.C.P. art. 11.07 and T.C.C.P. art. 11.071 writs based on hypothetical cases. Students will also be expected to understand and effectively deal with potential procedural bars to their actual innocence claims.

3 Credits

Professor: James McGrath

This three-credit hour class is pass/fail. Only students who are in their last semester of law school may enroll. The class familiarizes students with the contents of the bar exam and seeks to impart the critical skills and strategies necessary for success on each day of the exam.

The class covers selected sections of several MBE and essay-tested subjects. Students complete diagnostics (practice exams) as homework.

The course is not intended as a substitute for a commercial bar-review course; indeed, students are urged to take a commercial bar exam. Students who do not want to take this as a for-credit course are encouraged to audit the class.

Prerequisite: Must be in last semester of law school.
